
A Fresh (or first) Read: Doyle's "Learner Centered Teaching"

This book presents the research-based case that Learner Centered Teaching (LCT) offers the best means to optimize student learning in college and offers examples and ideas for putting it into practice. It starts from the premise that many faculty are much closer to being learner centered teachers than they think but benefit from reflecting on their current practices and how they align with findings from learning science research.

Save our democracy and prepare students for work and life through teaching strong dialogue-across-difference skills! Please join Heather Keith in a community of practice on constructive dialogue in the classroom. Rather than a book study group, we will work through the faculty/teaching version of the <u>Constructive Dialogue Institute</u>'s "Perspectives" online course (60-90 minutes of "coursework" for each meeting–definitely not onerous) and then discuss how we might teach our students (the next generation!) to engage in civil and constructive discourse about relevant, controversial, meaningful, and newsworthy topics. With next fall's general election, spring would be a good time to explore how we can engage people with different perspectives in collaborative work that lets us solve problems and move forward together. This series is sponsored by Faculty Development, CITL, and the Civil Discourse Steering Committee.

Sponsored Programs and Grants Management

Sponsored Programs is making a change to our office supports the dissemination of funding opportunities from external grants. For the past 15 years, we have leveraged the ProQuest PIVOT grant opportunity database. Effective later this spring, Sponsored Programs will no longer be supporting the PIVOT platform; terminating our contract. You can still use PIVOT's search engine on their main home page to find funding; however, all accounts in PIVOT will be deactivated. This is a strategic change as Sponsored Programs will now work with an external consulting firm, Hanover Research, to provide expanded grant prospecting and writing support services. Sponsored Programs will also take a more hands-on approach in identifying potential sponsors using other resources. While this change leads to a short-term inconvenience for current PIVOT users, Sponsored Programs feels it is necessary. Research Help at the Bonnie


