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Message from Provost Usher


Welcome back to campus and the spring semester that reminded us it's really still winter!

This weekend, I met with many of our students who will be traveling later this week for Radford's Advocacy Day in Richmond. I loved talking to our students and was wowed by their stories of why they study at Radford. Radford rightfully touts our affordability, but the students described their rich academic experiences and relationships with their faculty. It reminded me that we need to communicate that we aren't cheap – we offer affordable access to high quality education for every student who enrolls.

I used to work in a Center for Teaching Excellence, and I felt a little chagrined each time I announced my title. I felt we should more honestly have been the Center for Teaching Pretty Well But Always Learning to Get Better. Many aspects of teaching change, including our students (and their various strengths and gaps in preparation), technology, the economy, and the scholarship in our fields. A commitment to helping them learn and be prepared to be citizens and leaders of thriving communities does not. As we talk about building a Curriculum Lifecycle that values keeping our academic program relevant, it's not because we aren't already Pretty Excellent, but because we value always getting better.

As the students tell it, the educational experience at Radford is rich even if not all of our students are, and we are committed to continue to offer the best programs possible. Everyone who receives Threads, should take pride in your contribution to building our academic programs.

Dr. David Beach named Director of Undergraduate Curriculum



After an internal search held in October of 2023, David was named *Director of Undergraduate Curriculum*. This position reports to the *Director of Institutional Effectiveness and Quality Improvement*. In this position, Dr. Beach will:

- Support campus wide (across all sites) department and faculty engagement with general education curriculum, including general education alignment, course designation, and assessment.
- Summer work as needed to support orientation and onboarding activities
- Chair the REAL Council and facilitate the meetings of that body.
- Provide guidance and support to the campus during the revision to gen ed
- Manage transfer petitions and VA Transfer efforts related to general education
- Collaborate with other offices on initiatives related to general education

David Beach, a professor in the English Department and affiliate faculty in Theatre and Cinema, is an educator, playwright, director, and dramaturg. In his 8th year at Radford, his mantra is: "Whatever we do, we do in service to our students." He is a faculty senator, currently serving his third term as Secretary. David served on the REAL Implementation Steering Committee, chairing the Academic Support subcommittee, the President's Task Force on Freedom of Expression and Civil Discourse, and the Academic Program Review and Enhancement Committee. He is advisor to two Highlander Student Media publications (*Exit 109* and Whim), has taught in the Governor's School, and was on the Women's and Gender Studies Advisory Board. In 2017, he received the Dorothy Golden Award for Excellence in Teaching First-Year Writing, a national award. David is currently taking courses in screenwriting at UCLA, to complement his MFA in playwriting (Hollins

University) and his PhD in education with a focus on composition and rhetoric (George Mason University). As a playwright, he has won several awards for his work, notably the Kennedy Center's John Cauble Award for Outstanding Short Play for *Mothers and Terrorists*. He currently serves as the Vice-Chair of the National Playwriting Program through the Kennedy Center's Education Division. As a director, he has collaborated with a writer/performer on a solo show, *H5*, an adaptation of Shakespeare's *Henry V.* This show is currently on tour and will be featured in the Fringe Festival at the Southeastern Theatre Conference in March.



As President Bret Danilowicz communicated in his campus-wide December 18th email, the Realizing Inclusive Student Excellence Quality Enhancement Plan (RISE QEP) was officially approved by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) as part of Radford's accreditation reaffirmation. This gives us the "green light" for implementing the RISE program at Radford! We will be kicking off our inaugural Faculty Institute on January 11 with 16 faculty who have committed to a year-long intensive effort to improve student success outcomes in their courses. This spring, we will also be continuing to work with RISE Community Action Teams (RCATs) as they develop targeted programming to build community in their respective colleges. One of the first RCAT events this semester is the Black History 101 Mobile Museum visiting Radford on January 29, brought to campus by Dr. Fredrick Douglas Dixon and a collaborative campus effort through African American Studies. 
From Dr. Allison Wisecup, current Assessment Director (who is retiring at end of spring 24):

The Office of Undergraduate Research & Scholarship (OURS) has many ways to support and facilitate your research, scholarship, and creative inquiry. Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowships (SURF) - \$3400 awards are made to undergraduate students and their faculty mentors. The goal of the SURF program is to foster a community of undergraduate research and engaged scholarship during the summer months at Radford University. This program will fund a variety of projects where students mentored by faculty engage in an original, intellectual or creative contribution to a discipline. Applications are due in February 9th. www.radford.edu/surf

Highlander Research Blitz: April 3rd, 2024, OURS and the College of Graduate Studies will host the first annual Highlander Research Blitz Competition for students enrolled in graduate and undergraduate programs through Radford University (main campus, RUC, RHEC, SVHEC). Contestants will have three minutes to describe their original mentored research or creative inquiry. Aided by a single image or graphic on a PowerPoint slide, participants compete to see who can best communicate their work and its significance to a non-specialist (layperson) audience.

Competitors will submit their three-minute pre-recorded video presentation to be considered as a part of the application process by February 19, 2024.

Submissions will be evaluated based on the delivery and communication of the content and not the quality of the video. Selected students will be invited to participate in the in-person, live competition on April 3, 2024 in Kyle Hall from 5 to 7 pm.

Radford University Women's and Gender Studies, Director of Women's and Gender Studies Application Portal

The Radford University Women's and Gender Studies Program is seeking applicants for the position of Director. The Women's and Gender Studies Program offers an interdisciplinary minor, currently enrolling 33 students and graduating an average of 12 students per year. The Program aspires to create a learning community of students, faculty, and staff dedicated to exploring how conceptions of gender, race, ethnicity, class, sexuality, age, physical ability, and nation intersect and impinge upon the lives of individuals across the globe.

Responsibilities: The Director of Women's and Gender Studies will 1) coordinate the development and revision of curriculum; 2) coordinate assessment and submit assessment data for the Minor and for all sections of WGST 200; 3) schedule sections of WGST 200, 400, 290 and 490; 4) hire, train, assign and evaluate adjunct faculty; 5) oversee the operating budget; 6) submit periodic program review documents; 7) advise all students in the WGST Minor; 8) supervise internships; 9) work with the Associate Director to plan co-curricular programming throughout the year and particularly during Women's History Month; 10) work with WGST Affiliated Faculty from across the University to improve and expand the program.

Compensation: Compensation for the stipend and course reassignments is subject to approval by the applicant's department chair/school director, as well as the dean.

Qualifications: Ph.D. or terminal degree in an appropriate discipline; Tenure or tenure-track faculty status, tenure preferred; Demonstrated expertise in Women's and Gender Studies; Demonstrated commitment to the field of Women's and Gender Studies.

Application Materials: 1) A cover letter that explains the applicant's reasons for seeking this position, prior experience, and expertise in Women's and Gender Studies, and demonstrated commitment to the field of Women's and Gender Studies; 2) Curriculum vitae; 3) A memo from the department chair or school director supporting the application.
