The Electoral College and the 2024 Presidential Election: Dr. Daniel Reed, Associate Professor, Department of Political Science

This presentation will discuss what the Electoral College is and how it will determine the winner of the 2024 Presidential Election. This fall, the winner of the presidential race may be determined by only 7 "swing states," largely due to the rules of the Electoral College. Already, both the Harris and Trump teams are preparing for a likely battle over the voters in these states, the counting of the votes in these states, and the eventual certification of the Electoral College

winner. Join Dr. Daniel Reed for an informational session on the Electoral College, why it is important, how it works, and what sort of legal challenges may be expected over the certification of the electoral results in these battleground states.

Depolarization: Pragmatic Pluralism in Electoral Politics: Dr. Steve Fesmire, Professor of Philosophy and Chair of the Department of Philosophy & Religious Studies
